আধুনিক খন্ড কবিতায় অভ্যস্ত ছাত্র মধ্যযুগের দুই শ্রেণীর খন্ড কাব্যের সঙ্গে পরিচিত হয়ে প্রভাব তুলনা বিচার করতে পারবে। বৈষ্ণব পদাবলীর কাব্য সৌন্দর্য ও অনুভূতির গাঢ়তা তাদের সৃজ্যমান সাহিত্যবোধ কে সমৃদ্ধ করার ফলে সাহিত্যের ছাত্র হিসাবে বিভিন্ন কাব্যের অন্তরঙ্গ পাঠে সমর্থ হবে। শাক্ত পদাবলীতে তৎকালীন পারিবারিক ও সমাজ জীবনের পরিচয় পেয়ে তারা ইতিহাস নির্মাণে সমকালীন সাহিত্যের ভূমিকা উপলব্ধি করবে। একইসঙ্গে বাংলাদেশ এ প্রচলিত বিভিন্ন ধর্মীয় ভাবনা ও দার্শনিক চিন্তার সঙ্গে পরিচিত হবে, উপলব্ধি করতে পারবে। মধ্যযুগের সামাজিক ইতিহাসের স্বাক্ষর চন্দ্রীমঙ্গল সাহিত্য পাঠ মধ্যযুগের সমাজ অর্থনৈতিক রাজনৈতিক ইতিহাস বুঝতে সাহায্য করবে।

English Major

Semester 1

DSC 1: Introduction to English Literature (Poetry)

This paper offers foundational knowledge about English poetry from the Elizabethan Age to the Modern Period with respect to select poems in their syllabus.

Semester 2

MDC 2/ CC: Introduction to English Literature (Prose)

This paper familiarizes students with the evolution of English prose from the Elizabethan Age to the Modern Period vis-à-vis specific texts prescribed in the syllabus.

SEC for MDC: Business Communication

This course will enable the students to develop their overall communication skills, which will be useful in navigating the professional world as well as life in general.

English Minor

Semester 1

(Minor 1): Introduction to English Literature (Poetry)

This paper offers foundational knowledge about English poetry from the Elizabethan Age to the Modern Period with respect to select poems in their syllabus.

Semester 2

(Minor 2): Introduction to English Literature (Prose)

This paper familiarizes students with the evolution of English prose from the Elizabethan Age to the Modern Period vis-à-vis specific texts prescribed in the syllabus.

IDC (Inter-Disciplinary Course): English

This course will acquaint the students with specimens of English poetry and short story. This paper will lay the foundation for higher studies in English and help students understand the interdependence between literature and culture.

AEC (Ability Enhancement Course): Compulsory English

This course comprises an array of English poems and short stories that primarily aims to inculcate a strong sense of the English language in students.

Course Outcome

CBCS (Choice Based Credit System)

English Honours

Semester 1

CC1: History of Literature and Philology

This paper will help in creating the basic premise of teaching literature. The component of language will help students who want to research or work in the field of language and linguistics.

CC2: European Classical Literature

This paper will help in creating a basic knowledge about classical literature. Students who wish to pursue a career in theatre will find this component extremely informative and useful.

AECC1: Communicative English

This paper helps the students to develop their overall grammatical skills in English and helps in a better communication in any career they will decide to pursue.

Semester 2

CC3: Indian writing in English

This paper teaches about Indian Literature written in English. Students can pursue research work on the basis of the knowledge gained from this paper.

CC4: British Poetry and Drama (14th- 17th Century)

This paper will accentuate one's knowledge of British literature and the theatrical world of the Renaissance period. This can establish the basis of teaching as well as working on professional theatre.

Semester 3

CC5: American Literature

This paper will broaden the student's knowledge about American history and culture along with the literature that was produced through the different centuries.

CC6: Popular Literature

This paper familiarizes students with popular literature and culture. Students will be able to discern the growing importance and also understand the cultural significance of popular literature.

CC7: British Poetry and Drama (17th-18th century)

This paper will accentuate one's knowledge of British poetry and drama produced in the 17th and 18th centuries. The students will develop an understanding of the various eras in the history of English literature the Renaissance, Restoration, and Neoclassical period through the representative work of that time.

SEC-A2 Business Communication

This paper helps the student to develop a better communication skill and will equip the students for clerical jobs. They will also be able to pursue their careers in journalism.

Semester 4

CC8: British Literature (18th Century)

This paper will elevate the students' knowledge about British literature of the 18th century through the poetry, prose, and drama in the syllabus.

CC9: British Romantic Literature

This paper will accentuate the student's knowledge of British romantic literature through the poetry and prose of that era. The students will appreciate the triumph of the Romantic imagination in the writings of this period and also understand the spirit of that age.

CC10: 19th Century British Literature

This paper will give an insight into 19th-century British literature, society, and culture. Students will be equipped to identify and analyze the social, economic, and political contexts that influenced the literature of that period.

SEC-B2: Academic Writing and Composition

This paper helps the students to analyze a text and develop their own critical opinions.

It also helps the students to give wings to their imagination, thus, increasing their chances of pursuing a career in freelance writing.

Semester 5

CC11: Women's Writing

The very title of this paper suggests its relevance even in the 21st century. World history has been a witness to women being marginalized, secluded and confined within the home. These texts are a testimony to the fact that women, too, think, feel, and can articulate their thoughts in a language that they have made their own. Women's writing has distinctive features which become evident through a study of these books. In a world that still seeks to keep women out of the mainstream, a women's writing gives a voice to the needs and desires of one half of the world's population.

This paper incorporates all genres – poetry, essay, novels – both in English and in translation. Thus, students are able to grasp the distinction between different modes and styles of writing. As is evident, each genre has its distinctive features. This enables students to express their thoughts through diverse methods.

CC12: Early 20th Century British Literature

English literature is directly related to world history. This paper is important in that the student learns about the political, social, and historical context that shaped our lives and lifestyles. The events of this period have a direct bearing on how each country and its citizens negotiate with world affairs.

Along with world affairs, language, too, was changing. Early twentieth-century literature reveals the fragmentation, frustration, and sense of ennui that people felt in the wake of the two world wars. Thus, philosophy and psychology become two important related subjects. A student who is affected by this historical period can explore the field by taking higher studies in related subjects. There is huge scope for further studies after studying the contents of this paper.

DSE-A1: Modern Indian Writing in English Translation

This course will elevate the student's knowledge of the importance of translation of literary works in a cross-cultural country like India. Studying texts translated from different Indian languages will kindle their interest in translated works.

DSE-B1: Literary Types, Rhetoric and Prosody

Literary types, Rhetoric, and Prosody help to strengthen language skills. The paper prepares students for pursuing their literary careers as it provides a grounding in the structural aspects of various literary genres and their rules.

Semester 6

CC13: Modern European Drama

European drama of the 20th century was innovative and experimental. Learning about this would enable a student to think about various possibilities in ways of literary expression.

CC14: Postcolonial Literature

Post-colonial literature is self-evidently important for it gives a holistic perspective of world affairs. Students learn about the various aspects of human psychology through the renderings of the master/slave dichotomy.

This paper encompasses every aspect of literature, including human psychology. History, and philosophy. This gives the student enough knowledge, confidence, and language skills to face the world and make a place for himself/herself.

DSE-A4 Media and Communication Studies

Media Studies opens up a whole world of career opportunities for an English honours student. With a background in English literature, language, and world affairs, this is probably the best training for a student to pursue a career in advertising, or media communications. This is a field with immense opportunities.

Journalism. A much-coveted line of work is one of the direct offshoots of students who graduate in this subject,

DSE-B3: Autobiography

Autobiographical works provide direct insights into the workings of the human mind. Thus, it is evident that the English syllabus, as has been formulated, provides immense career opportunities, while at the same time, providing a base for creating well-rounded individuals and citizens who can help build a just and integrative society.

English General

Semester 1

CC1/GE1: Poetry and Short Story

This course introduces the students to the vast world of English literature specially acquainting them with specimens of English poetry and short story and inculcating in them a love of English literature. It forms the foundation for higher studies in English.

AECC1: Communicative English

This paper helps the students to develop their overall grammatical skills in English and helps in better communication in any career they decide to pursue.

Semester 2

CC2/GE2: Essay, Drama, and Novel

In this course, students get familiar with specimens of English drama, novels and essays. It broadens their intellectual horizon and makes them conscious of the relationship between literature and culture.

Semester 3

CC3/GE3: Women's Writing

This core course focuses on women's writing as a powerful step towards women's empowerment in society. This course helps the students to understand the social condition of women in different climes through the ages.

SECA2: Business Communication

The course will enable the students to enter their future professional careers in the corporate business world with ease and confidence.

LCC-1 (L1-1): Language variety and Stylistics

This course inculcates in the students a strong sense of the English language and teaches them the different uses of the language. This will equip them to utilize future job opportunities with confidence.

Semester 4

CC4/GE4: Academic Writing and Composition

This paper helps the students to analyze a text and develop their own critical opinions.

It also helps the students to give wings to their imagination, thus, increasing their chances of pursuing a career in freelance writing.

SECB2: Creative writing

The course will encourage the students to pursue writing as a career.

It also helps them to make an idea of the publication process. The students may also find inspiration in pursuing a career in the publishing industry.

LCC-2 (L2-1): Language, Society and Personality

This course consists of stories of inspirational personalities of the country. Their narratives might help in the overall development of the students and will motivate them to reach beyond the ordinary and strive for a better tomorrow.

Semester 5

DSEA1: British Literature

This broadens the spectrum of the students and acquaints them with British literature and culture during various literary ages. This may intrigue them to pursue a career in literature.

DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY

Programme Outcome:

The study of geography seeks to focus on places of earth, their evolution, their mode of formation and related modification. While dealing with the physical perspectives, this discipline has centered upon temporal and spatial variations of phenomenon all over the earth. Apart from the physical domain, the evolution of human geography concerning major aspects of human society, culture, race, economy has also strengthened the basic framework of the subject. Students pursuing their career in geography have a large variety of scope in all its sub-disciplines.

The present Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is introduced in the undergraduate courses in Geography following the guidelines of University Grants Commission. After completion of undergraduate degree, students are able to pursue M.A. / M.Sc. in geography. They can also opt for competitive examinations after the completion. Examinations relating to civil services (both Central and State), Indian Railways, Banking are few examples to be noted in this regard. Students are also provided the opportunity to pursue B.Ed. degree after the undergraduate courses get over. School Service Commission (Central and State) are the most important options that students interested in becoming teachers opt for after their graduation. Higher studies after qualifying National/ State Eligibility Test (NET/ SET) provides smooth ways for pursuing research work or apply for the position of lecturers or assistant professors in colleges.

1. The new system has been prepared to provide a holistic understanding of the students focusing on its two main branches: Physical and Human.
2. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Discipline Specific Electives (DSE) have provided acquisition of knowledge in specific geographical issues of climate change, environmental concerns, acquisition and management of resources, management of coasts, promotion of tourism and development of rural and urban areas thereby promoting sustainable development.
3. The physic-socio-cultural issues definitely lead the way to problem solving; thus, students will be able to diagnose the problem and recommend measures that may help in policy framing.
4. The subject has a historical record of making maps of various regions of the world.

Students in this respect have a future scope on cartography.

5. The subject also provides a scope for social survey, in a rural or an urban area which help the students to communicate with the residents, evaluate the relationship between physical and cultural landscape and bring out the major concerns or issues of that area.
6. The study of geography is related to the measurements of various phenomenon of the earth's surface. The subject introduces the use of some major instruments that enable the students to get familiar with the procedures of measurements.
7. Students will be able to focus on regionalization and bring out specific localized problems that would help in effective management of resources, both physical and human.
8. The study also provides a huge scope of research in various contemporary fields and students can strengthen their research career by publications of their research work, attending seminars and conferences that would provide them a global recognition and carrying out research projects.
9. After completion of undergraduate course, students will acquire enough knowledge on remote sensing and global navigation system. At the same time they will be able to prepare maps with the aid of GIS.
10. Apart from these, students can also apply for masters in archaeology and museology.

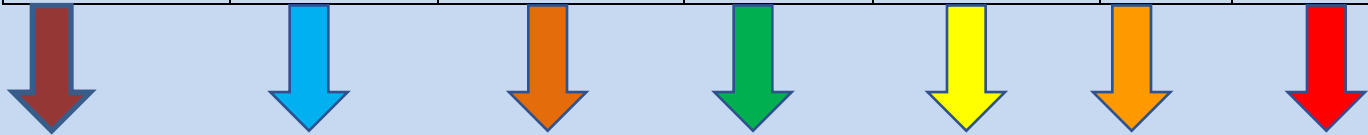

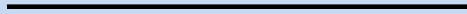
- To promote an understanding of the processes of change and development through which human societies have evolved to their present stage of development.

An understanding of the basic social and political issues helps students in securing a strong foothold in the social sector also.

Programme Specific Outcome:

PSO I

Under the present CBCS system, Political Science as a General Paper to start with, in all its totality gives students a detailed and a clear understanding of some of the salient features of the Indian Constitution starting from an individual's Fundamental Rights to specific political issues of the Indian polity such as religion, caste, tribe and women which students require to know and understand as responsible Indian citizens and future generations of the country.

PSO II

A clear understanding of the various theories of Political Science such as the historically relevant Marxism-communism, the rise as well as the contemporary relevance of liberalism and globalization is also essential to understand any given society which would help oneself to get absorbed as well as serve the society one wishes to. Further knowledge about how a federal system works, how State Governments in India work along with the bureaucracy and judiciary such as the Lok Adalats, Gram Panchayats is important since it prepares a student for a professional/ work environment that may range from the urban to rural system in India.

PSO III

As per the new CBCS syllabus, Political Science as General paper along with the introduction of the Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Courses provides students a holistic approach towards the subject opening up multiple avenues of Law, Human Rights, Public Administration, Indian Foreign Policy, the functions and structures of International Governmental Organizations like the United Nations. Understanding the legal system in India and also creating awareness on legal and social issues are also some of the main purpose of these courses. This instills in a student inter-disciplinary approach which will further help in working in a variety of field ranging from Law, Public Administration and the Non-Governmental Organization / social sector.

PSO IV

Along with imbibing knowledge about social and political issues, Political Science as a General Paper in its Course also introduces students to the field of research in social sciences. Students start with a very first knowledge about research in the vast field of social sciences where quantitative and qualitative methods of data collection, data interpretation and representation are taught. An understanding of basic research methods is beneficial to both students of Honours and General courses as the former would have an advantage if an academic pursuit leading to research is opted or if job in the social sector is chosen by the latter. General students shall also benefit as a basic understanding of research is essential for any study or understanding of social issues such as poverty, unemployment, climate change, environmental protection and awareness,

biodiversity preservation and conservation, food security or any other issues leading to population studies.

PSO V

A critical and creative understanding of pertinent social, political, cultural and economic issues is developed amongst students. It pushes them to think beyond pre-conceived borders of majoritarian thinking and come up with new ideas and understanding of issues that has been conventionally and historically relevant.

PSO VI

To prepare young minds for a future that they can grow around issues (of political, social and economic concerns) that potentially affect our everyday life. To begin with a vivid understanding for the students of not only their own country but also engage in a comparative analysis of politics and government around the world, particularly of big powers like the United State of America, the United Kingdom, the People's Republic of China and the neighborhood such as Bangladesh who are globally relevant.

Semester I

CC (Major & Minor)

Political Theory: Foundational Concepts

CO I: This paper is designed to help student understand and grasp the basic concepts in politics, leading to its theorization and everyday applicability.

SEC 1 (Major)

Democratic Awareness through Legal Literacy

CO I: This paper is designed to help students to acquire knowledge as well as understanding about different terms/ ideas and concepts relating to the legal structure of India such as FIR, arrest warrant, etc.

IDC (Major & Minor)

Understanding Governance

CO I: Students will acquire knowledge about some of the most contemporary as well as dynamic forces relating to governance in general, with specific examples drawn from our society also.

CO II: The changing nature of governance in the era of globalization will be highlighted to the students. This shall enable them to have a comparative orientation while studying this course.

Semester II

CC 2 (Major & Minor)

Constitutional Government in India

CO I: This course is designed so that students are familiarized with the structural and institutional practices found in India.

CO II: This paper will make students understand the division of power between various organs of the government and also create awareness about the way in which the government functions through its various organs at various levels.

CO III: Students will also be acquainted with contemporary issues such as religion, caste etc that cause a hindrance to the practice of constitutional democracy in India.

SEC 2 (Major)

Understanding the Legal System

CO I: As the name of this paper suggests, it helps to student to understand the basic structure of the legal system found in India, also including some of the concepts and terms used therein.

Course outcome

CBCS (Choice Based Credit System)

CC1: Political Theory

This paper helps the students to acquire a theoretical knowledge regarding the origin of the state, government and other societal institutions, their activities and functionalities, problems and interactions with each individual which in turn helps these students to develop a conscious public opinion of their own.

CC2: Comparative Government and Politics

The study of different types of government and their respective political systems enables the students to make a comparative study of how politics is organized and interlinked in varied political systems around the globe. This might help them to do higher studies in other countries and understand cultures, behavior, pattern and socio-economic background of different countries.

CC3: Government and Politics in India

This course provides an insight into the origin of the Indian Constitution and help the students to have a fundamental knowledge of the structures of government, policy making, public issues and spreading awareness of one's individual rights and duties as an Indian citizen. This might encourage a student to pursue a career in politics in future.

CC4: International Relations

Studying International Relations helps the students to learn about the global issues of each and every country of the world in a refined understanding. It not only provides an opportunity and the knowledge to specialization in a variety of fields but it also helps in development crucial transferable skills like analytical and interpersonal adeptness.

DSE5: Public Administration

This course focuses on the theoretical knowledge of the professional employees of the governmental organizations as well as their accountability for performing their duties. This module will motivate the aspiring students towards vocational trainings and gain basic knowledge of governance and policy analysis.

DSE6: Human Rights: Theory and Indian Contexts

The primary objective of this topic is global awareness of inherent human rights, maintaining them and to know when they are being violated. Thus, this provides pursuing students with basal knowledge to meet the requirements and learn strategies they will need to undertake the career path this sector provides.

SEC3: Legal Literacy

The topic enables the students to understand the concept of law, to understand and recognize the premises of what law has to offer and to solve certain problems in their lives by bringing the legal machinery into force. It also prioritizes a common knowledge of social values and spreading light on legal rights and duties.

SEC4: Elementary Dimensions and Research

This paper enables the students to develop an insight of being able to draw a hypothesis, think critically, conduct research unbiased and analytically before coming to a conclusion and lastly, to communicate effectively. This helps the aspiring scholars give a preliminary idea about research work and how can it be pursued for higher education.
